5. Electoral Roll Report.

In absence of Rosie Tate, the Secretary, Grace Morgan, read out the Electoral Roll Report:

"Any lay person who is 16 years or older and resident in the parish, or if not resident, has worshipped at St Mary's regularly over 6 months, may apply to be entered on to the Electoral Roll. Members of the Roll are entitled to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) and to become members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC). Over the last year 3 members are deceased and the Roll has 4 new members, giving a total of 115 members at the date of the APCM.

77 roll members are resident in the parish, 38 are non-resident. This represents 96 households."

7. TREASURER'S REPORT:

The Treasurer reported that we had had a relatively successful year in 2021 despite the pandemic; spending was generally down on previous years; we did make a profit overall. He went on to say that there are challenges this year due to seriously increased costs in heating the buildings plus other items and the unfortunate reduction in planned giving. No figures were offered but he said the PCC would have hard decisions to make at their next meeting. Questions were invited - none.

ADOPTION OF ANNUAL ACCOUNTS:

Seconder: Sue Johnson. Proposer: Kate Stobart Agreed unanimously.

Ron Davis asked at the end of the finance section about church attendance. He said that he had seen the statistics for attendance in the booklet and gueried the virtual attendance, asking if this was quantified and recorded. The Chair replied that it was and that it was noted in PCC meetings guite regularly. David Lax explained that you can find this data on our You Tube channel and that by Tuesday each week, the number was usually complete for that week. Dot Clark added that some of this data about 'remote' participation was in Sarah's part of the office report.

8. APPOINTMENT OF INDEPENDENT EXAMINER FOR ACCOUNTS:

Trevor Hogg of TPA Accountancy Services, South Shields.

In 2021, it was reported that this would be the last year for using Trevor's services, as a matter of good practice. However, the Finance Committee decided that it would not be appropriate to make the change during an Interregnum. Efforts will be made to find a replacement Examiner at the end of this financial year.

A very detailed report, with lots going on in our Church, as well as the fluid situation around Clergy. Sue Johnson and David Tompkins thanked for all this work.

11. RENEWAL OF SAFEGUARDING POLICY - PAGE16.

Sue Johnson has lead role. Policy slightly updated. Questions invited – none.

Sue thanked all those who had undertaken the courses requested and advised there were more in the pipeline.

Sue urgently needs volunteer to help with the administrative side of this work, including DBS checks, to comply with the law. St Mary's takes safeguarding very seriously.

12. Group Reports.

Last year was a very peculiar time with further lockdowns and then re-emerging to face a different way forward. However, there is still so much of which to be proud both in terms of liturgy and many other things that have continued or been adapted during the pandemic. Statistics for attendance at our Church, on page 17, evidence that we are moving forward again, albeit that numbers are generally down on where they were prior to 2020. Pages 18/26 and 29/41offer us an extensive overview of last year and it makes very interesting and uplifting reading. Questions invited – none.

"As we move towards the end of our meeting, I would like to make a few remarks. Obviously, we do not have a vicar at this present time, so no Vicar's report but there is an update on this situation which I can share. Your PCC elected Sue Johnson and myself as the two parish representatives to help in the recruitment of our new vicar. The Parish Profile is complete and will be available soon for all to see. PCC has agreed it and we are working with the Archdeacon Catherine of Lindisfarne on the advertisement which should be out next month. The closing date for applications is 22 June and interviews are scheduled for 21 July. This does mean that, as long as an appointment is made, we should have a new vicar in post before Christmas. The interregnum did not begin until September last year so if we have someone before the end of this year, we will only have been 'vicarless' for just over a year. The Church of England moves

very slowly in so many ways so let's pray we secure the right person for our church in July.

Normally at this point in the meeting our Vicar would present his or her report and thank so many people for their amazing work at our church. Future plans would also be presented to us as indeed was the case last year. I have mentioned the current recruitment plans for our new vicar and we have heard more about the grounds redevelopment and sound system schemes. So, it falls to me as the chair of this meeting to thank all those who give so unstintingly of their time, talents and money to this church. I am not going to name people as every person here today and those congregation members who are unable for whatever reason to be at this meeting, contribute to St Mary's in some way. Yes, we are smaller band of active Christians in this place than was the case a while ago and we are learning how to operate as such. We look forward to our new vicar coming to lead us on the next stage of our Christian journey and I end by asking you all to pray for the church in this place that God will continue to guide and sustain us all as we move forward and bear witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ."

The Chair thanked everyone for attending and the meeting closed at 12.07 with the saying of The Grace.

PCC SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2022

2022 was another busy year for St Mary's. The PCC met on 12 occasions, including an Extraordinary Meeting in December, with the ratified Minutes being filed in the Church Office, accessible to all. A relevant "link" is included on the Notice Sheet, plus hard and emailed copies are available upon request. The Standing Committee held 9 meetings, to discuss urgent issues and prepare PCC agendas. Good attendances were recorded for all meetings.

The PCC worked hard to support the Parish Representatives and Churchwardens during the Interregnum and move of Ben Jarvis to the Cathedral for 4 months — A vote of thanks was given to Sue Johnson for tirelessly organising the staff rota and enlisting outside clergy to cover our Church Services, funerals, baptism etc. during this time.

As we emerged from the constraints of the pandemic, the PCC cautiously considered the reintroduction of practices which had been paused for health and safety reasons. These included offering Communion wine with effect from Maundy Thursday.

It can be noted from the 20+ proposals put to and approved by the PCC over the year, that members work diligently to ensure adherence to regulations and commitment to working practices.

Focus on the Mission of St Mary's continued to be upheld and expanded where possible, in the challenging times. The PCC approved Church collections to be donated to Church Action in Poverty, the Food Bank, Christian Aid and the 3 charities selected annually by the congregation. The introduction of the LLF Course was actively promoted, attracting good attendance and feedback.

PCC continued to carefully monitor the financial position of the Church, as reported monthly by the Treasurer. Tight control were exercised on income and expenditure to ensure the viability of the Church. Council was pleased to receive a letter of gratitude from the Diocese, acknowledging full payment of our Parish Share totalling £75,000 for 2022. To offset the dramatic rise in energy prices, the PCC approved an increase in the winter rates for Church and Hall hire. Following the introduction by HSBC of charges on Charity Accounts, the PCC also endorsed the move of the Church bank accounts to the ethical Co-op Bank. The draft budget for 2023, was approved by the PCC in November 2022.

Building and Resources work continued to be reported to PCC, for full discussion and consideration and the comments contained in the September Quinquennial Report "good care had been taken in looking after the building" reflected all the hard work done by this Group.

The long-awaited Grounds Redevelopment was started and completed successfully in 2022 The work was dutifully overseen by Cheryl Savage and her team, monitoring the entire project from beginning to end, whilst keeping the PCC updated at each meeting.

In October, the annual Church Fair welcomed many people from the surrounding area into church. A day to remember for all those attending, whilst also providing useful resources of £5,200 to allow St Mary's to continue and expand its work in the wider community.

Lay Licences to administer Holy Communion in Church, were renewed, following approval by the PCC. Gratitude was expressed to all volunteers participating in this important ministry.

Church Fees, Policies, CCLI Licence and the Grand Piano storage contract were reviewed by PCC and approved for a further 12 months.

In the usual way, members of PCC provided Parish Breakfast cover over the summer months.

Safeguarding, Health and Safety, Eco Church, Deanery/Diocesan/General Synod are all items addressed on the PCC Agenda each month, acknowledging the work of all those leading St Mary's in these areas.

In November, following his appointment as the new Incumbent of St Mary's, the Rev Nigel Taylor was warmly welcomed to his first PCC meeting. The Council looks forward to working closely with Nigel, as he leads us forward to the next stage in the life and work of our Church.

We have much to do but with God's help, we can move forward in love, faith and hope, to continue and extend our work at the centre of our local community.

Our retired clergy Eileen Noble has also helped where her health has allowed particularly on the pastoral side. Unfortunately, Eric Lewis has not been able to due to his ill health. We trust they will enjoy much better health in 2023

Our thanks to David Tompkins, who retired as warden in April and to Liz Hayes (Lay PCC Chair) who with Sue and with help from the Congregation and PCC prepared our Parish Profile. We were delighted that Nigel and his wife Kate felt called to St Mary's. Nigel was installed as our Vicar 16th November 2022, a night of celebration. We feel truly blessed.

We said a sad farewell to Ben following his appointment as Vicar of St Bartholomew Long Benton with our grateful thanks as our curate for 3 and $\frac{1}{2}$ years.

Sarah has now been our Office Administrator for over a year and we thank her for all she does for us.

Thankfully Covid was not as prevalent and restrictions were gradually reduced. We were able to offer Communion wine from Maundy Thursday.

Beryl Austoni was licenced by Bishop as an Anna Chaplain in March and Beryl with help from others was able to commence the monthly meetings of OWLS .

We are grateful to Marion Oakes on all her work in educating us on environment issues and helping us to be an Eco Church and enabling us to gain the Bronze Award.

Our Autumn Fair was again a huge success even though there was a time when it looked it might not take place. But thanks, to Grace Morgan for her perseverance and help of all the volunteers it made a substantial amount of money.

We continue to livestream our 10am service on a Sunday which enables those unable to attend to join in our worship. We welcomed many families to our Christingle Service. We were overwhelmed with the attendance at the Crib Service at the new time of 4pm and indeed numbers for all services at Christmas were up. The church was resplendent inside and out. We are pleased to report that numbers on a Sunday have also seen an increase.

A massive achievement this year was the completion of our redevelopment of our grounds. There was much upheaval for our regular congregation and hall users while the work was taking place. All rose to the occasion and we got through it. It was a very difficult time for those organising it. We owe a great al of thanks to Cheryl Savage and her team for that. Also, to Tony Garland for his perseverance in obtaining grant monies. The overall result is magnificent and well worth waiting for.

We appreciate the Sound System is in urgent need of attention. It had been hoped that progress would have been made, but rest assured this is now a priority for the coming months.

The energy crisis made us rethink how we heated our church for services. With much effort we have made savings with this and we thank everyone for putting up with a somewhat cooler church than we would usually have over the winter months. We also had to make a charge for the cost of heating to all users with the result we sadly lost some of our hirers. We hope there will be a change in the coming months.

Our music continues to play a huge part in our worship and we thank Penny and Mike with the choir for this. Also, we have enjoyed hearing our Young Notes.

Another year when we sadly lost several beloved members of our congregation. May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

Our sincere thanks to everyone who has helped in anyway to run our church during the vacancy and to Nigel for accepting the challenge to be our Vicar. May he find it fulfilling and long may he stay. Finally thank you to you all who have stayed with us and to those who have joined a big welcome.

Service Planning Group Report

The role of the group in the ongoing life and mission of St Mary's

To consider all aspects of worship and liturgy thus providing a varied programme suitable for people of all ages, using all available resources.

We meet approximately every 2 months to plan both regular and occasional worship.

Key results of our work in 2022

We started 2022 still under Covid restrictions; the congregation were wearing masks and only receiving bread at communion, but a slight increase in choir numbers was allowed.

The Christmas and Epiphany season came to an end with our Candlemas service closely followed by Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent. Although we did not have formal Lent groups, we were encouraged to investigate online courses or read relevant books.

Nicola Denyer facilitated the "Living in Love and Faith" discussions on several Sunday morning sessions in the first few months of the year.

Holy Week and Easter services were led by all of our clergy team and included a procession of Witness outside the Church on Palm Sunday; meditations led by Nicola and Penny from Monday to Wednesday in Holy Week; foot washing during Maundy Thursday Service; dramatic music and readings by Ben and the choir on Good Friday; a dawn service on Easter Day with a range of music including Ben singing the "Exultet" and Mike, Martin and Simon playing guitars and saxophone to accompany the singing of the Mass and hymns.

The last of the Covid restrictions had been removed and on Easter Day we celebrated without masks and were able to take

the wine if we wanted.

We continued to provide the regular services during the Interregnum and when Ben went on placement to the Cathedral. Thanks to the clergy team, especially Rev Clare Connors, and visiting clergy from Easter to September. Many thanks also to Sue Johnson for sorting the service rota at this time! Much time and effort was needed! During these months there were just 2 occasions at 10am when we had a Service of the Word as no priest was available.

We celebrated Pentecost with the President being Rev Peter Knibbs, who with Margaret Evans as preacher managed to combine Pentecost with the Celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of her Majesty Queen Elizabeth 2nd. We wore red, or red, white and blue in celebration and we had cake!

The announcement of the death of Queen Elizabeth 2nd gave Clare as President just a day or two to put together a meaningful Eucharist. It was also our Patronal Festival but Clare's sermon linked the late Queen with the Virgin Mary. We were able to celebrate the Queen's life more fully when Ben led the Sunday services the next week. The special booklet produced was given out to all those who receive Communion in their homes. The Church had also been open at this time for our local community and many people signed our Book of Remembrance.

We welcomed Niall Cooper who spoke about his work with Church Action on Poverty as part of our Generosity services, which was followed by our Harvest Thanksgiving with donations of Food and Money being given to the local Foodbank. To round off "Creationtide" we thought more fully about Climate Change with the help of Margaret Evans and Marion Oakes and what we could do to really make a difference.

In October Ben led a Healing Eucharist when he and Clare offered the laying on of hands, which was much appreciated. All Saints was celebrated on the morning of 30th October, with All Souls being commemorated later that afternoon. On this occasion we remember all those who have died, both recently and long ago. This service provides all members of our community with the chance to be still in our busy world and to light a candle.

Remembrance Sunday was marked with our usual Eucharist and finished with the 2-minute silence at 11am.

In November we welcomed Nigel as our vicar, who, with Ben's help went straight into a busy round of school visits and preparation for Advent and Christmas which had all been "planned".

The Advent Sunday Carol Service marked the beginning of the new Church year, and was well attended, providing time and

space for everyone to think about their Christmas celebrations and traditions.

During Advent we held a range of services including, Christingle, Toddler Carol and the Crib service on Christmas Eve when it was good to see families and young children in Church with worship more suited to their needs.

Our annual Carol Service was well attended but there was also a further opportunity to sing carols in the pub, with Mike and Martin accompanying on guitars.

Flower Arrangers Group Report

- On request pedestals have been arranged in memory of loved ones for Sunday services

Key results of our work in 2022-23

- At Easter we received £178 in donations for lilies and flowers in church. We had arrangements around the font and on the high altar this year (not on the window sills) to enhance those viewing the Easter services through streaming. The silk Easter garland was placed over the front door.
- The flower team provided weekly arrangements throughout the year. In addition we provided arrangements for 2 weddings and a diamond wedding.
- In September a special pedestal and small arrangements were made in memory of the late Queen Elizabeth.
- At Christmas we decorated the church with greenery, memorial candles and lanterns. 44 white seven-day candles were donated by members of the congregation. Two matching pedestals were arranged for each ambo. Lanterns and greenery were placed on each of the windowsills and the high alter was decorated with memorial candles and greenery. The Christmas garland with lights was placed over the front door.
- A drive for flower funding in September, through church notices, resulted in our receiving £150 from members of the congregation.
- Our flower fund balance stands at £369.29

Key plans for development in 2023

- Recruitment of new members of the floral art team.
- To liaise with other flower arrangers from local churches to exchange ideas.
- To research a more fully bio degradable oasis which is fit for purpose but is part of the church's net carbon emissions by 2030.
- To access flowers which do not have a carbon footprint, to buy local when possible.

- A key area of concern is for the future of our memorial candles at Christmas as the church is not insured for live candles to be left to burn unattended.

- We are to receive a donation of silk flowers which will be used to bulk out pedestals and reduce costs.

Fabric Report

There can only be one place to start the report this year – the redevelopment of our grounds.

The work undertaken by BCE Northern commenced in July 2022 and was completed bar a few minor works in November. The grounds have been transformed – safe, functional, and attractive. The outside now matches the inside. The additional lighting at Christmas looked magnificent. Our grateful thanks to Dave Haddock for very kindly supplying all plants at cost, to the congregation for their donations and to Cheryl Savage with her team of volunteer gardeners who carried out all the planting, including hundreds of bulbs.

Our sincere thanks to our Architect Wardell Armstrong, the construction team BCE Northern but especially to Cheryl who steered and oversaw the project together with the BaRG team. One further thanks to Tony Garland who once again was able to secure several grants which enabled us to complete the project.

All work undertaken is recorded in the Logbook, held in the office.

Church:

- Inside the main issue has been electrical work 2 light fittings have failed. These were part of the re-ordering of the church and have proved to be extremely costly to replace.
- Underneath the church there have been problems in the cellar and with the drainage. The sump pump has been repaired and the drains improved, alongside the ground's redevelopment.
- In addition, the drains have been repaired and cleaned. There are ongoing problems (which are costly to resolve) resultant from inappropriate items being flushed down the toilets.
- In the cellar the tap was leaking. A connector was installed along with a new tap.
- Broken roof tiles were repaired, 3 loose ridge tiles re-fixed, all gutters and gullies cleared.
- External signage has been updated with the new phone number and website address.
- Looking to improve the external lighting at the front of church.

In general, however, the church building remains in good order.

Church Hall:

- Ongoing problems with moisture in the rear hall. An overnight heater has improved things, along with the removal of overhanging branches.
- The storerooms have been redecorated including an anti mould coating
- Negotiations are underway with our neighbour about removing the tree.

Gas usage is now monitored via the gas provider's online portal

The Quinquennial inspection was carried out in September by our appointed Architect Mark Stafford. The report concluded that "the church appears to be very well kept and would seem to have an effective regime for routine maintenance". It then listed 222 items that require or will require attention over the next five years. BaRG are working their way through the list.

The wardens would wish to record their gratitude to the Building and Resources Group, Roger Windass, David Tompkins, Cheryl Savage, Richard Hart and John Charlton for all their work in the maintenance of our buildings. Further thanks to John Charlton who continues to carry out various duties without a murmur and to Ian Guthrie who works his way through the ever growing works list.

St Marys Concert Series Group Report

The role of the group in the ongoing life and mission of St Mary's

- Our prime aim is to deliver quality professional and amateur classical music performances to a wide range of audiences.
- To reach out into the wider community and to use our church building to entertain and to provide a space for social and community outreach.
- To cover costs, including artists' fees and church costs such as heating, lighting, photocopying, advertising, and general use of the building.

Key results of our work in 2022

- Our 2022 season of Saturday evening concerts commenced on 30th April with a wonderful performance from Bradley Creswick, violinist. We then had a marvellous rendition of some Scottish folk music from Michael Biggins in June. Two more concerts would have followed in September but due to the passing of our Queen, these were cancelled at short notice. The autumn season saw Anna Dias & Friends return to St Mary's in October. Our season ended on the 3rd December with a Christmas concert from the Bishopwearmouth Choral Society.
- Our evening concerts were interspaced with Sunday afternoon free concerts commencing with pianist Fiona Gould and followed by mezzo soprano Rosie McMorrow with pianist Daisie Sitlani, both in May. Also in May the amazingly talented students of David Murray gave us a bonus concert in the evening. In June we welcomed Iona Brown, principle violinist with the Royal Northern Sinfonia and in July the young students of Fiona Gould provided us with splendid renditions of short pieces from youngsters of all ages. The newly formed Westerly Trio joined us in November with a repertoire of music for flute, violin and piano. These afternoon concerts are most popular and although free to attend we do collect good donations to St Mary's from them. However, it is more important to offer these as an outreach in the community so that anyone can enjoy a concert without having to pay.
- To safeguard our finances we continued with the arrangement that performers would receive 66.6% of ticket sales (after a deduction of our own costs set at £180). This continues to work well and ensures that the concerts are financially risk free to our church.
- A very pleasing profit of £3385 was realised from these events and transferred to the church account.

Key plans for development in 2023

- Various concerts have been planned for 2023 with the first concert having commenced on 4th February and other free concerts have also been arranged.
- So far in 2023 the ticket sales have been rather disappointing for all concerts and David Murray tells us that they are experiencing a similar problem in other venues that he performs at. We are therefore looking at different ways of advertising to try and attract more people to attend our wonderful concerts.
- The concert series continues to help our church building provide a space for social and community outreach and new members to our group, or help for a particular concert, would always be welcome.

- •Continued support of leaders to complete their training and achieve their wood beads in the next year.
- •Progression of beavers, Cubs and Scouts to achieve their Chief Scout awards in 2023.

Key results of our work in 2022

DIOCESAN SYNOD

Diocesan Synod met on 26th November 2022, where the main items were deployment, budget planning and environmental policy. It was made clear that the financial situation is grim, and so work to reduce the number of stipend. DEANERY SYNOD

Tynemouth Deanery Synod met last Thursday 9th March as St Hilda's Marden. Following prayers for each parish, there was a presentation by Tim (Area Dean) about the work the Deanery Development Group is leading on behalf of the Deanery. All Deaneries in Newcastle Diocese have to submit a 3 year plan to the Diocese by the end of June 2023. The DDG have met a number of times and identified a number of short, medium and long term aims for Tynemouth Deanery. They've agreed that focusing on the gifts of the laity will be their first priority, and a 'Deanery Day' will take place on 10th June, which is open to all, and will be attended by Bishop Helen-Ann. We then had a presentation from Deanery Treasurer Iain, who gave us important stats re: deanery finances. I will send these figures separately. It is clear that Tynemouth Deanery is working with a deficit, and we currently have about 4 and a half full time stipendiary priests that we're not paying for. This is the case in other Deaneries too, but shows why we need to really discern future plans. I then gave the Deanery feedback on GS (see below), and was really heartened by the support shown to all the GS reps from Tynemouth Deanery, including those from different traditions and experiences. We talked a little about the Deanery Lent course which is going well here at St. Mary's, and ended in prayer.

GENERAL SYNOD

General Synod took place in London from the 6th to the 9th February. Much of the business related to Living in Love and Faith, and the motion that the Bishops brought to Synod to allow prayers and resources for offering SS relationships, and for new pastoral guidance to replace

Issues in Human Sexuality. On the afternoon of the 10th, we were all asked to take part in group work, talking about the motion and our feelings around the proposed prayers of blessing and other resources. I found this group work particularly challenging and upsetting, as did many others. The debate around the motion lasted for over 8 hours and was again challenging! However in the end all 3 houses of GS (laity, clergy and bishops) voted in favour of the motion. This result has caused a great amount of fear and pain, and the work is not even nearly done as the Bishops will bring the resources and the new pastoral guidance to the July GS, when it's likely the Conservative Evangelicals and others will seek to block any change at all, despite the fact that recent polls show a clear majority of churchgoers are in favour of SSM (same sex marriage). There were other important pieces of business – parish fees, the cost of living crisis and safeguarding were debated. The Church of England Bishop Helen-Ann was welcomed to GS for the first time, and she was so good to all of us reps.

Key plans for development in 2023

Deanery plan to be handed into the Diocesan Bishop's Staff team by the end of June.

Deanery Synod elections - 3 candidates prepared to stand for 3 places.




